Regular reading builds vocabulary, comprehension, creativity, and imagination, and helps prevent the “summer slide,” when skills can decline without practice. It also supports confidence and a lifelong love of learning.

All grade levels have summer reading expectations. Younger students will read multiple books, while older students may have assigned texts. Please review the grade-level directions below so your child stays engaged and ready for the new school year.

K	Read 14 books of your choice and complete 2 Book Reviews provided by the school at orientation.	Students are expected to fill in 2 book reviews that will be provided by the teacher. Draw a picture and rate the book by coloring in the stars at the bottom of the page. There are also fun suggestions of places you can read books over the summer. Have fun reading!
1	<i>Magic Tree House</i> (book of your choice, as long as it is an AR book). by Mary Pope Osborne	Students in grades 1-8 are expected to read their assigned novel independently, no accompanying assignment required. If a student receives an 80% or higher on the AR Quiz, they will receive a NUT Day!
